Save Gas, Money, Lives, and the Planet!

Proper maintenance extends the life of your tires and increases gas mileage. These small tasks also reduce the chance of blowouts, a major cause of accidents. Don't forget to check the spare!

1. Maintain proper air pressure as recommended in your vehicle's service manual.
2. Inspect for unusual wear on a regular basis.
3. Rotate the tires regularly.
4. Keep wheels balanced and properly aligned for even wear.
5. Buy a better quality of tire. They cost more, but replacing them less will save more money.

www.goodyeartires.com recommends the penny test to check for signs of tire tread wear. "Simply insert a penny into your tire's tread groove with Lincoln's head upside down and facing you. If you can see all of Lincoln's head, it's time to replace your tires."

Recycle used tires! All tires we collect at County facilities are sent to a certified tire recycler located in California. Why recycle?

1. Recycling waste tires keeps valuable resources out of the landfill. A tire recycler shreds and grinds them to remove the steel. The remaining rubber is milled into assorted sizes, depending on the end product.
2. Tires take up valuable room in the landfill. They can eventually leach chemicals into the soil.
3. Stockpiled or abandoned waste tires create a health hazard. Mosquitoes and other vectors use them as breeding grounds.
4. Left along roadways or rural paths, tires can be a road hazard, causing injury and property damage.
