Ensuring Responsible Spending of Recovery Act Funds

Funding available under the Recovery Act has clear purposes – to stimulate the economy through measures that modernize the Nation's infrastructure, improve energy efficiency, and expand educational opportunities and access to health care. HUD strongly urges grantees to use CDBG-R funds for hard development costs associated with infrastructure activities that provide basic services to residents or activities that promote energy efficiency and conservation through rehabilitation or retrofitting of existing buildings. While the full range of CDBG activities is available to grantees, the Department strongly suggests that grantees incorporate consideration of the public perception of the intent of the Recovery Act in identifying and selecting projects for CDBG-R funding.

Activity Name: East Stockton Storm Drain Improvements

CDBG Eligibility Category: 03J Water/Sewer Improvements

National Objective: 570.203 Special Economic Development Activity

CDBG-R Project Budget: \$319,124

Project Description: The San Joaquin County Public Works Department will oversee the East Stockton Storm Drain Improvement project. This activity will include the construction and/or repair of driveway cross drains in identified low- moderate income areas in East Stockton to address flooding on the roadways and on individual residential properties. This project is leveraged with an additional \$16,000 of FY2009 CDBG program funds, for a total project budget of \$335,124.

The drainage improvements will provide long-term economic benefit to approximately 12,730 residents living in the following identified areas:

The proposed storm drain improvement project will be sent out for bid to local construction companies through the County's procurement process. It is anticipated that this activity will address the Recovery Act by preserving and creating jobs and promoting economic recovery. It is unknown at this time the number of full- and part-time jobs that will be created and/or retained by this activity until the bid process has been completed. It is anticipated that Public Works will retain the services of a contractor for the proposed project and the project may take up to 24 months to complete.

Activity Name: ADA Accessibility Ramp Program

CDBG Eligibility Category: 03L Sidewalks

National Objective: 570.201 (c) Public Facilities and Improvements

CDBG-R Project Budget: \$54,094

Project Description: The City of Ripon will utilize \$20,997 CDBG-R to expand their current contract with a local contractor to install an additional 3-4 ADA accessible ramps

in an area identified, but not included in the current contract. The City is leveraging \$59,033 FY 2008 CDBG funds allocated to their ADA Accessibility Ramp Program.

The City of Lathrop is proposing to utilize \$20,218 CDBG-R for the construction of an accessible sidewalk with a handicap ramp in front of the Senior Center.

The City of Escalon is proposing to utilize \$12,879 CDBG-R for an ADA accessibility ramp at their Civic Center.

One of the main criteria for the use of funds is to ensure that the program can be implemented within 120 days of grant award. Therefore, this activity was selected based upon the readiness of the project in terms of expanding an existing contract with a Change Order, going out to bid and initiating the activity within a timely manner.

The ADA Accessibility Ramp Program will preserve and create jobs, which promotes economic recovery. It is estimated that a minimum of 3 full-time jobs and 5 temporary jobs will be preserved/created.

Activity Name: Fostering Energy Independence Program

CDBG Eligibility Category: 14F Energy Efficiency Improvements National Objective: 570.202 (b)(4) Eligible Rehabilitation Activities

CDBG-R Project Budget: \$110,163

Project Description: The City of Tracy will utilize CDBG-R program resources to support the purchase and installation of a solar panel system for a local food bank, in order to foster energy independence.

One of the main criteria for the use of funds is to ensure that the program can be implemented within 120 days of grant award. Therefore, this activity was selected based upon the responses from the solicitation of proposals from local renewable energy firms.

It is anticipated that this activity will not only create temporary jobs for manufacturing and construction vendors, but will promote one of the Recovery Act goals to foster energy independence.

Activity Name: Energy Efficiency Program

CDBG Eligibility Category: 14F Energy Efficiency Improvements National Objective: 570.202 (b)(4) Eligible Rehabilitation Activities

CDBG-R Project Budget: \$99,631

Project Description: The City of Manteca will utilize CDBG-R funds to expand their Energy Efficiency Program, which involves the retrofitting of non-efficient street fixtures located in identified low-moderate-income areas of the city. The identified

areas are within Census Tract 51.08, Block Group 3 and Census Tract 51.09, Block Group1-3. This activity is leveraged with an additional \$186,000 of EEBG program funds. The total project budget of \$285,631 will be used for the Energy Efficiency Program.

It is anticipated that this activity will not only create temporary jobs for manufacturing and construction vendors, but will meet one of the Recovery Act goals to promote energy conservation activities.

Activity Name: Lodi Community Center Parking Lot CDBG Eligibility Category: 03G Parking Facilities

National Objective: 570.203 Special Economic Development Activity

CDBG-R Project Budget: \$343,558

Project Description: The County and the City of Lodi will continue to support improvements at the Lodi Community Center. The proposed project is to construct a 120' by 200' parking lot, utilizing \$343,558 CDBG-R funds.

The County will oversee this activity, which will address the Recovery Act by preserving and creating jobs and promoting economic recovery. It is anticipated that a minimum of 3 full-time jobs and 5 temporary jobs will be active in the paving, marking, and landscaping the parking lot.
