- I. Call to Order Chair Ken Vogel called the meeting to order at 10:09 a.m.
- II. Approval of Minutes –October 9, 2023, minutes not approved due to lack of quorum.
- III. Correspondence Advisory Board member has not submitted required application despite overdue appointment. Board of Supervisors may appoint an alternate if this continues to go unresolved.

IV. Old Business

- a. Delta Issues:
 - i. Tunnel project faces financial/political hurdles; focus shifted to levee maintenance and funding.
 - ii. Environmental Impact Report approved, despite opposition, pressure on the Department of Water Resources to appeal.
 - iii. Los Angeles water infrastructure and Colorado River Agreement concerns discussed.

V. Legislative Updates

- a. New Regulations
 - i. AB 1864 (Connolly Bill):
 - 1. Stricter pesticide restrictions near schools (including private schools).
 - 2. Annual notifications required; no spraying 6 AM-6 PM.
 - 3. Schools rarely check notifications; state pushing for tighter rules.
 - 4. School reached out for a pesticide use complaint, however the farmer was from a neighboring county.
 - ii. Enforcement Changes
 - 1. Higher end of fine range increased from \$5,000 to \$15,000; fine will be given per violation. An example: a home nearby complains of

- having headaches and having hard time breathing, this would equate to a higher end fine. Workers get pesticides on them; this equates to a separate fine.
- 2. Discretion for Agriculture Commissioners may be eliminated, fixed penalty matrix.
- iii. Neonicotinoid Regulations: Restrictions challenge growers; potential local emergency exemptions.
- iv. Burning Ban:
 - 1. Complete ban on farms <250 acres, >250 acres was already banned as of January 1st, 2024.
 - 2. Biochar machines (e.g., Caribou Biofuels) explored as an alternative.
 - a. Mobile units may pay growers for biochar (fertilizer byproduct).
- v. Mill Tax Increase: Pesticide prices rise over 3 years; revenue funds DPR, local agencies.

b. Property Tax/Assessments/Crop Removal

- i. Property Tax/Assessments: Meeting with Assessor Steve J. Bestolarides to address the tax impacts of removed permanent crops. (e.g. grapes, walnuts).
- ii. Crop Removal
 - 1. 75,000 acres of walnuts to be removed to bring the price of walnuts in compliance with supply.
 - 2. 15,000 acres of vineyards to be removed.
 - 3. Lots of Bing Cherry trees to be removed, unknown estimated acreage.

c. Energy Concerns

- i. PG&E to implement rate hikes.
- ii. More solar to curb costs on energy consumption.

VI. New Business

- a. Agricultural Commissioner's Report
 - i. Abandoned Orchards: Harbor pests (e.g., naval orange worms); legal process ongoing for 40-acre cherry orchard case.
 - ii. Staffing Shortages: Retention issues for agriculture biologists; HR reviewing salary adjustments.
- b. **Motion to Hold Quarterly Committee Meetings**: Consensus to do quarterly meetings.
