Safe Camping: A Smarter, More Compassionate Path Forward

San Joaquin County is exploring a Safe Camping proposal that would turn a portion of the former Oakmoore Golf Course into a structured, service-supported site for unsheltered residents. Modeled after Placer County's success, the site would provide a clean, secure space with rules, basic services, and access to care—offering a safer alternative to growing street encampments. While not a permanent solution, Safe Camping is a critical first step on the path to stability, treatment, and housing.

Local Leadership, State Alignment

The state's new "model ordinance" for unhoused communities calls on cities and counties to address homeless encampments. San Joaquin County is already on that path:

- Shelter First: We've doubled local shelter capacity using County funds
 —offering real options before enforcement.
- Respectful Enforcement: Safe Camping will offer structure and services, creating stability and accountability.
- Integrated Services: Programs like the BeWell Campus connect people to mental health, addiction treatment, and housing.
- Strong Partnerships: We coordinate with CalTrans, CHP, Union Pacific, and nonprofits to create a united response.

Leading Beyond the Model


San Joaquin County goes further:

- SJCARES, led by Probation, builds relationships and accountability to promote positive outcomes.
- Technological Tools track available shelter beds in real time, improving outreach and response.
- Emergency Funds from opioid settlements help keep shelters open and serving the most vulnerable.
- Strategic Enforcement now sits within Human Services to ensure compassion and consistency.

San Joaquin County is not waiting to be told what to do—we are leading. Safe Camping is a realistic, responsible step toward restoring public spaces, protecting our most vulnerable residents, and building a stronger path to housing and recovery.

Be Well Campus Hits Major Milestones: A New Era of Mental Health Care for San Joaquin County

San Joaquin County is taking bold action to transform the future of behavioral health—and this month, the vision behind the Be Well Campus took two major leaps forward.


A First-of-Its-Kind Facility

In April, the Board of Supervisors unanimously approved a \$261.8 million budget to launch the project's first phase and awarded a design agreement to Herrero-McGuire Hester Joint Venture. Just weeks later, the County received a \$137 million grant from the State's Behavioral Health Continuum Infrastructure Program—one of the largest single investments in County behavioral health infrastructure to date.

Together, these milestones mark the official beginning of a project that will bring comprehensive mental health and substance use treatment services together under one roof.

"This isn't just about building a facility—it's about building a system of care," said Board Chair Paul Canepa. "The Be Well Campus will help us meet the mental health and substance use needs of our residents, reduce homelessness, and create pathways to long-term recovery—all here in our community."

Located on 23 acres of County-owned land in French Camp near San Joaquin General Hospital, the Be Well Campus will serve as a regional hub for crisis care, detox and sobriety services, youth and family outpatient support, and residential mental health treatment. When complete, it will offer 172 beds dedicated to psychiatric and substance use disorder care—many of them the first of their kind in the San Joaquin Valley.

Supervisor Sonny Dhaliwal emphasized the importance of keeping care close to home:

"When a young person experiences a mental health crisis, families shouldn't have to drive hours to find help. Be Well means help is right here—in our community—when it's needed most."

Securing the Funding—and the Future

The Be Well Campus is being funded through a mix of local, State, Federal, and private contributions, including National Opioid Settlement dollars, Proposition 1 funds, and allocations secured by the late Senator Dianne Feinstein. With the State's recent grant, the County has now secured over \$200 million of the total project cost, with additional funding in the pipeline.

Supervisor Robert Rickman credited years of planning and responsible budgeting:

"Because of strong financial stewardship, we're able to bring in major outside funding without burdening local taxpayers. This is the result of teamwork and long-term vision."

What's Next

Construction is expected to begin in late 2025, following environmental review and permitting. The first phase is scheduled for completion by mid-2027. A public groundbreaking ceremony will be held later this year.

As Supervisor Steve Ding put it:

"This project means real care, close to home—for Lodi, for Stockton, for the entire County. We're not just talking about change—we're building it."

The Be Well Campus represents a commitment to compassion, coordination, and community. San Joaquin County is proud to lead the way.
