

SUBJECT: Report on Exclusive Emergency Ambulance Provider Contract Compliance

The EMS Agency Report on the Exclusive Emergency Ambulance Provider Contract Compliance for AMR for the months of July and August 2008 is the fourteenth opportunity to report on AMR's performance. The AMR contract establishes accountability for meeting specific standards and provides the EMS Agency with complete access to data and information on AMR's operational, clinical, and administrative performance.

July – August Report:




AMR's July-August 2008 response time compliance for all ambulance zones met or exceeded the 90 percentile standard set by the County with 93.20% for July and 93.84% for August.

AMR adjusted post assignments and the system status management plan in July 2008 to improve performance in the lower call

volume sub-zones of A2, A3, B4, and B5. The EMS Agency is continuing to monitor and assist AMR in analyzing the performance data for improvement opportunities. The complete compliance report for July and August 2008 may be viewed or downloaded from the EMS Agency's website: www.sigov.org/ems.

Comparison of 2004 to 2007/2008 Data:

Now that the County is reaching the halfway point in AMR's five year contract it is an appropriate time to compare the ambulance response time performance from 2004, before the EOA was established, with the ambulance response time performance from the past twelve months under the EOA contract standards.




The data shows significant reductions in ambulance response times since the implementation of the exclusive AMR contract. In Zone A (greater Lodi) the urban response dropped 4 minutes and 12 seconds (39%), in Zone B (greater Stockton) the urban response dropped 2 minutes and 40 seconds (28%), and in Zone C (greater Tracy) the urban response dropped 5 minutes and 9 seconds (45%).

Suburban and Rural ambulance response times have also decreased significantly under the AMR contract.

In 2004, suburban and rural response times were tracked together. 2007/2008 suburban and rural data had to be combined to allow a comparison with 2004.

In Zone A (greater Lodi) the suburban/rural response dropped 6 minutes and 43 seconds (31%), in Zone B (greater Stockton) the suburban/rural response dropped 4 minutes and 13 seconds (21%), and in Zone C (greater Tracy)



the suburban/rural response dropped 3 minutes and 1 second (19%). The decrease in suburban/rural average response times is even more significant: Zone A improved 32%, 9 minutes 5 seconds; Zone B improved 31%, 8 minutes and 39 seconds; and Zone C improved 41%, 6 minutes and 47 seconds.

The comparison of urban and suburban/rural data from before and after the creation of the exclusive ambulance system validates the decisions made by the Board of Supervisors in creating an exclusive, high performance contract based ambulance service in San Joaquin County.



On June 28th, our son became a bystander victim of violent crime and was shot in the back of his head when he stopped into a convenience store in Tracy. Sanford and Damian were at the scene. We believe the fast response, quick thinking and professional expertise demonstrated by these men are what saved Junior's life.

Thankfully, God granted us a miracle and Junior survived the gun shot wound to his head. The doctors at Stanford were amazed that he withstood this kind of injury without severe and major trauma. You can imagine the heartache and relief our family has gone through.




