Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Emergency Solutions

Grant (ESG) and Home Investment Partnerships (HOME)

Each year, San Joaquin County receives an annual allocation of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG), and HOME Program funds from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) to assist low and moderate income persons, provide decent housing, a suitable living environment and/or expand economic opportunities. These funds are allocated utilizing a formula which considers population, poverty, overcrowded units, and age of housing. The County, as an "entitlement county", then allocates these program funds, to the Urban County jurisdictions consisting of the unincorporated areas of the County and the cities of Escalon, Lathrop, Manteca, Ripon and Tracy. The City of Stockton and the City of Lodi are "entitlement cities" and each receives a separate allocation from HUD. Approximately half of the County's annual allocation is allocated to the aforementioned cities, which in turn, allocate these funds to different activities to meet priority needs and the specific objectives identified in their communities. It is estimated that the Urban County's 2019-2020 allocation will be as follows:

CDBG

\$2.6 million

ESG

\$200,000

HOME

\$1.1 million

There may also be some funds from previous years' allocations that will be redistributed at this time.

The County will begin accepting applications on December 17, 2018. An application for the use of CDBG, ESG, and HOME funds can be obtained through the Internet at http://www.sigov.org/commdev, under Quick Links. The application is available in WORD format. Printed applications can be obtained from the County's Community Development Department by calling (209) 468-3175.

The completed applications will be reviewed by County staff to determine whether the proposed activity meets HUD's national objectives and local County objectives.

Furthermore, the proposed activity will be reviewed for compliance with HUD program eligibility criteria. All proposals that meet these requirements, will then be reviewed by the Technical Advisory and Policy Advisory Committees for adherence to the County's 2015-2020 Consolidated Plan. These bodies will then recommend to the County Board of Supervisors which proposals should be funded. All applicants will be notified in writing of funding recommendations in February 2019. The County Board of Supervisors is scheduled to conduct a public hearing in March 2019 to consider the recommended proposals for funding of San Joaquin County's portion and formally approve them in May 2019. Funds allocated as part of this process will not be available until July 2019. Program funds are not available to individuals.

To be considered for funding, an original completed and signed application must be received at the San Joaquin County Community Development Department, located at 1810 E. Hazelton Avenue, Stockton, CA 95205, by 4:00 p.m. on January 25, 2019. A separate application must be submitted for each proposed activity. Faxed copies of the application will NOT be accepted. Applications received after the deadline, regardless of the postmarked date, will NOT be accepted. Applications submitted without the required attachments will NOT be accepted.

Applicants proposing a CDBG or HOME activity located in, or providing benefit to residents of the cities of Escalon, Lathrop, Lodi, Manteca, Ripon, Tracy, or Stockton, should contact the respective city for their program applications. Each jurisdiction will have its own application process, with most of the application filing periods closing in January 2019.

A public informational meeting will be held at 1:00 p.m. on Thursday, December 13, 2018 at the San Joaquin County Community Development Department, located at 1810 E. Hazelton Avenue, Stockton. All interested parties are invited to attend and discuss local community development needs and to obtain answers to any questions pertaining to the application process. Attendance at this meeting is not mandatory to be considered for funding.

IMPORTANT HIGHLIGHTS AND CHANGES

Based on monitoring visits and conversation with the local HUD office and representatives, the County is aiming to make significant changes to its CDBG Program to better meet the needs of the community and meet the requirements set forth by HUD. These modifications will be a significant change from the status quo of years past, but will ultimately have a positive effect on the Program ensuring funding remains in place and the end users are benefited the most. The County will be holding a public meeting on December 14th to review and discuss these changes in further detail with all participating cities:

- 1. The CDBG application will now have the following minimum and maximum grant requests:
 - Public Service: \$5,000 Minimum / No Maximum
 - Public Improvement and Facilities: \$150,000 Minimum / \$2 Million Maximum
- 2. For those applicants using "area benefit" method to document beneficiaries, documentation will now be required to ensure the area (census tract/block group) is 51% or above the low/moderate income threshold. The following web application will allow applicants to search by address to determine eligibility. A printout of this map search is required with the application.

- Although allowed in past allocations, sidewalk improvements and handicap ramps
 does not meet a "presumed benefit". Area benefit will need to be documented for
 this type of project. See note above for documenting this benefit correctly.
- 4. Awarded contracts will now include a 24 month contract term to expend and produce a beneficiary to low/moderate income persons. The County must only have 1.5 times its annual allocation in unexpended funds on-hand by year end, which is a HUD requirement. The contract term will ensure agencies expend their funds in a timely and efficient manner.
- 5. The County will be imposing a 50% expenditure rule for each agency that has received funding. The expenditure rule will require grantees to expend and report 50% of its current or past year's allocations, prior to applying for future funds. The expenditure rule will encourage grantees to expend their funds and not "hold" them until the end of the contract term.

Example: XYZ Corporation has been awarded the following: \$15,000 in 17/18 and \$25,000 in 18/19. XYZ corporation will need to ensure that \$20,000 (50% of TOTAL awarded grant funds) is expended by the 19/20 NOFA deadline, which will most likely be in January 2019.

6. For many years, the County has used a formula based process to award funds to participating jurisdictions in the urban county's CDBG Program. In addition to the formula based system, the County will now begin scoring individual applications to determine funding awards. The County will still utilize a similar distribution formula, but due to high demand of funds, this will prioritize applications that will best meet the needs and requirements of the CDBG Program

7. The Scoring Criteria for this application (CDBG only), will be as follows:
