PUBLIC NOTICE- 30-DAY PUBLIC REVIEW & PUBLIC HEARING
DRAFT 2024-25 ANNUAL ACTION PLAN

The County of San Joaquin has prepared a draft of the 2024-2025 Annual Action Plan, which represents the fifth program year of the County's Consolidated Plan (July 1, 2024-June 30, 2025). The Annual Action Plan details specific projects to be funded with U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) funding allocated to San Joaquin County and the cities of Escalon, Lathrop, Manteca, Ripon, and Tracy who participate in the 'Urban County'. The projects detailed in the draft plan are to be funded with 2024-25 allocations that are estimated to be: \$2,860,646 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), \$1,286,290 HOME Investment Partnership Program (HOME), and \$246,142 Emergency Shelter Grant (ESG) funds and will address housing and non-housing community development needs identified in the County's 2020-2025 Consolidated Plan. In addition to the annual allocations received for these Programs, the County will also be including Program Income (PI) funds for the following: Up to \$500,000 in CDBG PI and up to \$1.8 million in HOME PI.
