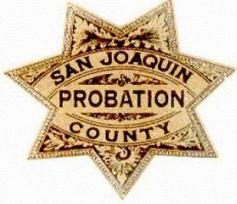

Dr. Edward J. Latessa



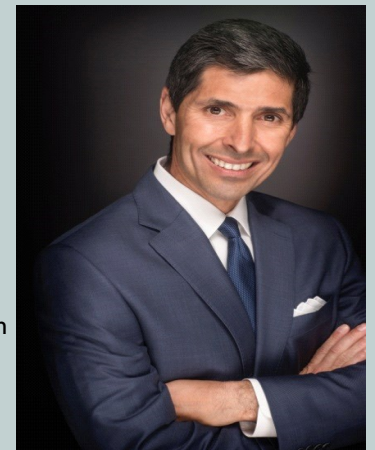
Dr. Latessa is the only researcher and professor of higher education who was named among the top innovative professionals in criminal justice.

Dr. Edward Latessa, director of the School of Criminal Justice at the University of Cincinnati, has recently been named “one of the most innovative people in criminal justice” by seasoned criminal justice leaders and professionals in the United States. Dr. Latessa earned this recognition from a recently completed national, multi-faceted survey about innovation and criminal justice reform conducted by the Center for Court Innovation in partnership with the Bureau of Justice Assistance and the U.S. Department of Justice.

As the field of criminal justice continues to evolve, visionaries and innovators like Dr. Latessa will pave the way for a greater understanding of the opportunities and challenges that actively shape the field and our communities. Dr. Latessa offers a clear and compelling vision for what works in correctional programs, drug courts, correctional intervention, and juvenile justice programs, among other areas. He has provided hundreds of workshops and keynote addresses, perpetually examining and developing new strategies and evidence-based practices that help criminal justice professionals better understand and more effectively fight crime.

Michael G. Santos

Michael G. Santos was arrested on August 11, 1987, when he was 23. Following convictions in the Western District of Washington on charges related to cocaine trafficking, Federal District Court Judge Jack Tanner sentenced Michael to 45 years. While incarcerated, Michael earned a bachelor's degree from Mercer University, a master's degree from Hofstra University, and he published several books to help others understand more about prisons, the people they hold, and strategies to prepare for law-abiding lives upon release. Michael concluded his obligation to the Bureau of Prisons on August 12, 2013, after serving longer than 26 years in custody. He became an adjunct professor at San Francisco State University 17 days after concluding his term.
